## 1. GENERAL STUDIES COURSES

## 2. HISTORY MAJOR COURSES

The following are the course requirements for your major. Please track progress on your major and other graduation requirements on your CAPP report and **see your History advisor regularly**. Your major should be declared with the Secondary Education Concentration (HIS1). You **do not** need to declare a minor in Secondary Education. Your GPA in your content area coursework must be 2.75 or higher to be accepted for Student Teaching. **Courses with the “§” symbol are required for licensure and must be passed with a grade of “C” or better. C- or lower is not an acceptable grade for licensure.**

### HISTORY MAJOR ELECTIVES: UPPER DIVISION

You need to take at least 18 credit hours of upper division (3000-4000 level) courses in History, selected in consultation with a designated History advisor. At least one of these courses must be an American History course (HIS 3400-3699), one must be a European History course (HIS 3100-3399), and one must be a World History course (HIS 3700-3799). The History department recommends that HIS majors take HIS 3720 Themes in World History as one of their upper-division electives.
