
Overcoming the Pandemic of Racism

During this pandemic we have witnessed the convergence of two public health crises: COVID-19 and the continuing impacts of institutionalized racism. Structural inequities are intertwined with our nation's history, and show up in a variety of ways.

People of color have long had to endure the legacy of housing discrimination, disinvestment in their communities, more exposure to environmental toxins, and lack of economic opportunities. These structural inequities have led to poorer health outcomes — including a higher incidence of chronic diseases — for people of color. Racist structural inequities are an ongoing public health crisis that demands immediate attention.



Keynote | brother jeff

A native of Northeast Denver, Jeff S. Fard, better known as brother jeff, is a multimedia journalist, historian and community organizer who lectures nationally speaking to youth, students, social organizations, and professionals about subjects including cultural identity and history, diversity, self-empowerment, community building, economic development, health disparities, and the uniting power of art. In 1994 he founded brother jeff's Cultural Center—located in the historic Five Points District in Northeast Denver—a space committed to fostering growth, strength, and voice in the community. He is also the publisher and editor of the award-winning monthly publication, 5 POINTS NEWS.

In 2000, brother jeff began organizing nationally to help reduce the disproportionate HIV and AIDS rate in the African American Community. served as an advisor to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and several other governmental and non-governmental organizations committed to eliminating HIV.

His current work includes gun violence reduction, mental health interventions and community mentor development.

Brother jeff is a board member for the Center for African American Health and is a past board chair of the Denver Foundation, which is the nation's oldest and Colorado's largest community foundation. He has received numerous honors for his work including being recognized by the late Steven Graham and the Community Resource Center as a "Legendary Leader of Colorado's Nonprofit Sector."

Awardees

Katia Campbell, Ph.D. | Faculty

Katia Campbell earned her doctoral degree from the University of Denver in Human Communication Studies with an emphasis in Rhetoric, Diversity, and Media Studies. Her scholarship, service activities, and teaching focus on rhetorical theory and criticism, free speech, cultural representation, popular media, and critical pedagogy.

Dr. Campbell founded the Dialogues Across Difference program at MSU Denver and regularly facilitates workshops on Communication and Diversity, Media Literacy, Free Speech, Public Speaking, and Dialogic Ethics. Dr. Campbell's frequent speaking engagements and webinars are on topics such as the ethical challenges of hate speech within the U.S. public sphere, and the intersections of free speech and academic freedom on college campuses. Dr. Campbell currently serves as MSU Denver Faculty Senate President.



Rosalind "Bee" Harris | Community

Rosalind J. Harris also referred to and known as Bee, is the owner, publisher and art director of the Denver Urban Spectrum newspaper. She has been "spreading the news about people of color," since 1987, celebrating 34 years in April 2021.

As an active member in the community, Bee is politically connected and has volunteered on campaigns locally and nationally. Over the years, with memberships and affiliations with diverse businesses and organizations, she has served on many boards as a director and as an advisor.

Bee has received numerous awards, including being selected as a 2020 inductee for the Colorado Women's Hall of Fame which will be celebrated in March 2022.



Ally Garcia, Ed.D. | Staff

Ally Garcia received her Doctor of Education Degree from the University of Denver. She currently serves as Assistant Dean/Director of TRIO Student Support Services at MSU Denver. Dr. Garcia has been a research assistant for Alliance for PROS based at Florida State University. She is currently an adjunct professor at the University of Denver where she focuses on issues regarding access, retention, racial justice, power, and equity.

Dr. Garcia has facilitated numerous workshops pertaining to race, diversity, and equity issues. She is currently engaged in research regarding critical policy analysis in higher education. She considers herself a critical race feminist practitioner/scholar. She won an early career award from ASPIRE in 2016 and an Inclusive Excellence award from the University of Denver in 2019. Her dissertation is entitled, A Policy Discourse Analysis of Disciplinary Transcript Notation in Cases of Sexual Assault on College Campuses.
