

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You Didn't Get Matched

Now What?

Not getting matched to a dietetic internship is not the end of your journey to becoming a registered dietitian! If you do not get matched, allow yourself to feel your emotions, but remind yourself of the following:



Second Round Matching

101

What is second round matching?

During the first round of the matching process, not all internships fill their spots. For the programs that wish to fill their spots, they will open unfilled positions up to applicants who did not match the first round. This process is called second round matching which starts the Wednesday following match day.

Can I use my pre-existing DICAS application to apply?

Yes. Pre-existing DICAS applications can be used to apply for second round match (including transcripts and letters of recommendation).

Will second round match set me back?

No! Second round match is within the same cycle of first round match. This means you will still be able to complete your internship in your originally planned time-frame.



How to Prepare for

Second Round Match

Step 1:

After match day, visit DnD Digital to view the list of programs that are participating in second round match. You will also see a list of ISSPs which are also considered in second round matching (see page 4 for more information on ISSPs). **Time is of the essence here so make sure you apply as soon as possible. These spots are first come first serve!**

*P.S. There are also programs that do not participate in DICAS. Contact your DPD Director for access to the Applicant Guide To Supervised Practice, where you can learn more about these programs.

Step 2:

Before applying, be sure to visit the program's website to learn more about their specific program and requirements! With this, **be sure to switch your personal statement around to reflect the program you wish to apply to.** We know you want to get matched, but be sure to treat this process as carefully as you did the first round!

Step 3:

Reach out to dietetic internship directors of programs that you applied to for first round match and ask for feedback! This will help you understand how you can improve in the future.





What are they?

ISSPs: Individualized Supervised Practice Pathways

Available for students who didn't match with a dietetic internship but have a **DPD verification statement** AND

for individuals with a doctoral degree without a DPD statement

Things to consider before applying to an ISSP:

- 1. Each program varies in program requirements so do your research
- 2. You will need to provide your DICAS application and all supporting documents when applying
- 3. Once again, time is of the essence with ISSPs! Be sure to apply as soon as possible.



What if you don't match second round

or get into an ISPP?

Option 1 Consider re-applying to DICAS

If you plan to apply to fall or spring match, be sure to meet with your professors and/or mentors to strengthen your application. Ask for feedback always and start accumulating more experiences through job opportunities, volunteer positions and/or credentials (NDTR, Certified Dietary Manager, Certified Lactation Consultant). Option 2

Explore the career options for non-RDN nutrition professionals

Nutrition and dietetic technician, registered (NDTR)

This credential will grant you more job opportunities within the field in various clinical, community and long term care settings. See page 8 and 9 for more details.

Certified Dietary Manager (CDM)

Certified dietary managers are considered qualified to enter or advance in the field of food service management or directing foodservice operations. See page 10 and 11 for more details.

Worksite Wellness, Health Coaching and More!

There are positions available in many sectors that will value your education without an advanced degree or RDN/NDTR/CDM credential. See page 12 for more details.

Nutrition and dietetic technician, registered (NDTR)

Students who graduate from an accredited nutrition and dietetics program with a DPD statement are qualified to sit for the nutrition and dietetic technician, registered (NDTR) exam. This provides you with a national credential and opens job opportunities to gain more experience.



How to apply to take the NDTR exam

The exam is administered through Commission on Dietetic Registration (CDR) and requires you to apply for eligibility. Reach out to our DPD Director for help sending your transcripts to validate your eligibility through CDR. Once you are validated, CDR will mail you information on how to register for the exam.

Job opportunities/ settings as an NDTR

Dietary technician at hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, retirement centers, hospices, home health-care programs, research facilities, schools, day-care centers, correctional facilities, restaurants, The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children, public health agencies, Meals on Wheels, health clubs, weight management clinics, community wellness centers, food companies and food distribution operations.

Sample Job Posting at Aveanna Healthcare for **Outreach Diet Technician**

Position summary:

This position works closely with the sales and operations teams to identify and screen referral sources in rural markets that may benefit from outreach inside sales calls. The outreach diet technician will conduct calls to high potential accounts; educating them on Aveanna Healthcare Medical Solutions product lines and services with the goal of developing relationships that will result in new referrals. Sales incentives are achievable for meeting pre-determined goals. They will document sales activity in Brightree and other sales tracking platforms. They will provide excellent customer service to referral sources and manage orders to ensure a smooth delivery of service to patients and providers. General duties include reviewing clinical documents, completing therapy prescriptions forms, and performing calculations. This position may also help with routine office duties such as faxing and scanning of documents, ordering supplies and answering customer phone calls.

Certified Dietary Manager (CDM)

Certified dietary managers are considered qualified to enter or advance in the field of food service management or directing foodservice operations. Graduates of MSU Denver's nutrition program (BS or MSND) are qualified to sit for the CDM exam through eligibility pathway II.



How to apply to take the CDM exam

You must first submit your application and transcript online at <u>www.cbdmonline.org</u>. After your application is approved, you'll be notified by email on how to register for the exam .

Job opportunities/ settings for CDM

Certified dietary manager in operations management, foodservice management, food safety, and nutrition/medical nutrition therapy.
