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What's Next? F-1 After Graduation

Whether you're in your final year of studies or just starting out, it's important to think about what your future holds after graduation. As an international student, you have a few options available, but it's crucial to plan ahead.

Once you complete your studies, there's a 60-day grace period for you to depart from the U.S. It's important to note that re-entry to the U.S. is not possible during this time, regardless of the validity of your visa or travel signatures. If applicable, you can change to another non-immigrant status during this grace period or continue your education with a graduate program. However, if this is not feasible, you must leave the U.S.



Work After Graduation- Change of Status

Post-completion Optional Practical Training (OPT) in the U.S. allows international students to work for up to 12 months in their field after graduating. It provides hands-on experience, networking opportunities, and career exploration. Students must comply with regulations by reporting changes promptly to their school official.

What's a "change of status"? For international students, a change of status typically refers to a modification in their visa or immigration status while studying or residing in a foreign country. This change could involve transitioning from one type of visa to another, such as moving from a student visa to a work visa upon graduation.
