


Doggie Daycare Lodo, and the Behavior Supervisor at Denver Dumb Friends League.

Small Steps, Big Impact:


Julia Sickrey's Path to Confidence and Research Success

hen Julia Sickrey moved from Michigan to Denver in August 2019, she did not expect that a simple classroom question would set her on a path toward national recognition and personal growth. But through a series of small decisions, rooted in curiosity and supported by strong mentorships, she found herself thriving in spaces she once never imagined en-




tering.

Julia began her college journey at Arapahoe Community College in spring 2020 before transferring to MSU Denver. Initially a political science major in fall 2021, she soon discovered that her true interests lay in understanding people, their emotions, and mental health. By spring 2022, she had switched her major to psychology. It was a conversation after Dr. Pam Ansburg's Careers in Psychology class that everything started to shift. Julia asked Dr. Ansburg, "What's the best way to prepare for graduate school?" Dr. Ansburg's advice was clear: get experience.

That simple recommendation sparked a cascade of meaningful decisions—joining the Psychology Research Club in fall 2022, seeking mentorship, and eventually becoming a research assistant.

"I was encouraged to reach out," Julia said. "Madi Barber, who was a member of the

Psychology Research Club and had been a research assistant before me, referred me to Dr. Jovan Hernandez—and that connection made all the difference."

Working with Dr. Hernandez, Julia engaged in research centered on resiliency, cognitive fusion, and mental health discrimination. She presented her first project at the Undergraduate Research Conference in spring 2023, marking her debut in academic presentation—and setting the stage for what was to come.

By spring 2024, Julia was presenting at both the Rocky Mountain Psychological Association (RMPA) and the Western Psychological Association (WPA) Conferences. WPA left a lasting impression—not just academically, but personally.

"I gained more confidence—not just as a student, but in who I am," she shared. "Being in a supportive space with people who understood me helped me feel more comfortable with my sexual orientation and more accepting of myself overall."

This growing sense of confidence prepared Julia for her most prominent opportunity yet: presenting at the Eastern Psychological Association (EPA) Conference in spring 2025 in New York City. Not only did she share her research on a national stage, but she also received the EPA Diversity Award, which included a \$250 prize.

"The award was presented during a keynote event, and I remember thinking, I really belong here. It was such a proud moment," she said. "We were in Times Square, trying new foods, and even went to the opera. I realized I was actually having fun. I wasn't just attending, I was thriving."

Throughout this journey, Julia points to the steady support of her mentors. "Dr. Hernandez was more than just a faculty advisor—he believed in me when I wasn't sure I believed in myself. His support changed my trajectory and helped me see what was possible."

Now, Julia is preparing to begin her master's in Clinical Mental Health Counseling at UCCS in May 2025. After exploring programs at CSU, UCD, and UCCS, she ultimately chose the one where she felt most aligned with the mission and community. Looking back, she shares a few lessons for others who may be at the start of their own journeys:

"Get out of your comfort zone. It may seem boring or intimidating at first, but if an opportunity presents itself—take it. You are smart enough. You do deserve to be there." And perhaps most importantly:

"At MSU Denver, faculty truly care. We're not an R1 institution, and that's actually a strength—students come first. Everyone here wants to see you succeed, even when you're still figuring out what success looks like for you."



From transferring colleges to standing proudly on stage in Times Square, Julia Sickrey's journey is a testament to how the smallest questions can lead to the biggest breakthroughs.



Kat's Cafe:

Summer's Best Tomato Salad

By Martina Grasse (originally by my Great Grandmother, adapted by my Mom, and then me)

The Basics, per person:

1 medium tomato

1-2t finely chopped onion

1T vinegar

Pepper and Salt (see optional note)

The Details:

Tomato: Any ripe tomato will work, you want about 1cup of bite sized chunks (not too small) per person. If using cherry tomatoes cut in half, cocktail tomatoes (like Campari) cut into 6th, Roma tomatoes cut into 6th or 8th and then in half (across the equator) If you can get one of Dr. Bob's Black Krim they are amazing, but any ripe tomato will work. If you love tomato, use a large tomato per person...

Onion: any fresh onion will work, yellow, red, white, sweet (my fave,) shallot, scallion. Finely dice or mince 1-2 teaspoons per tomato (more if you like onion.)

Vinegar: again your preference - plain white will work (it is what my great grandmother used) I like to use balsamic (I find one that has 5-10 calories per tablespoon) or you can gussie it up with red or white wine or even sherry or champagne vinegar. The only ones I would not use are apple cider or malt vinegars. If you like it milder, add a spoonful of water.

Pepper: fresh ground black is great, but if you prefer white, or just have the pre ground, no worries.

Salt: a sprinkle of salt, OR a tablespoon of crumbled Feta cheese.

Mix together and let stand about 10 minutes for the flavors to get acquainted. Mix again and enjoy.

My Great Grandmother added a few drops of oil (olive or more likely vegetable) along with the vinegar, mom left that out, I changed to balsamic; What will you do to make it yours?

What I do: 3 medium Roma tomatoes cut into 6th and then across the middle so 12 chunks per tomato, 2T chopped sweet Vidalia onion, 1T Feta crumbles, a generous grinding of black pepper, 2T balsamic vinegar.

This is perfect on a hot summer day, even better if you chill it a bit before serving though the tomato has more flavor served at room temp.

Dr. Nathan Mondragon is the Chief Innovation Officer at HireVue where he manages a 'startup' team that consists of people from science, product, data, and engineering. This team creates products that blend the best of science and technology that keep HireVue at the forefront of providing talent intelligence solutions. Nathan has over 30 years of extensive experience in creating software solutions that are driven by science. Most notably Nathan led or co-led:

- · the creation and delivery of the first ever online selection assessment in 1996.
- · the ground up build of the first integrated assessment solution and \$30M practice within an enterprise-wide ATS (Taleo) in 2004, and
- · as part of HireVue built and delivered the first-ever Al-driven pre-hire assessment solution in 2016.

Nathan has spoken with Congress and the White House on the proper methods to use AI to facilitate employment decisions. He has over 100

manuscripts, peer reviewed paper and book chapters, presentations, and workshops on IO Psychology and technology solutions. He has been quoted, interviewed, or featured on NPR, BBC, WSJ, Bloomberg, USA Today, and HBO about the best practices and future of science enabled talent decisions. Nathan received his B.S. in Psychology from Metropolitan State University of Denver and his Ph.D. in Industrial and Organizational Psychology from Colorado State University.
